Learning outcomes

The Advanced master's degree in EU interdisciplinary studies (evening programme) offers students who are already in the workforce courses which shed light on the legal, political, economic and historical aspects of European integration.

By the end of the programme, students will have acquired:

- in-depth knowledge of the economic, political, legal and historical aspects of European integration;
- analytical, reflective and critical skills with regard to these different aspects;
- a multidisciplinary approach to the challenges of European integration;
- an insightful perspective of current European affairs;
- an openness to foreign languages, with a course given in English.

Programme structure

The 60-credit (220-hour) programme consists of lectures and seminars, as well as a final paper.

Courses and seminars

- The first term consists of subject-specific courses, an 'Introduction to European information and documentation' course and the interdisciplinary seminar 'Think Europe'.
- The second term is devoted to the analysis of the scope and methods of European policies and the drafting of the final paper (16 credits).

Final paper

- Students are required to write a final paper in which they discuss topics covered during the master's programme.

For professional, social, medical or academic reasons, a student may request a reduction in their course load.

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The programme's courses and learning outcomes

For each UCLouvain training programme, a [reference framework of learning outcomes](#) specifies the the skills expected of every graduate on completion of the programme. Course unit descriptions specify targeted learning outcomes, as well as the unit's contribution to reference framework of learning outcomes.

- direct access to the advanced master's degree is available to students who are holders of one of the following qualifications (subject to the candidate's ability to demonstrate personal or professional experience in European affairs and/or previous academic results deemed sufficient by the admissions board, and subject to the board's decision and any additional conditions it may apply):
 - a master's degree other than those mentioned above, issued in the French Community, the Flemish Community or by the Royal Military Academy;
 - a second-cycle academic degree corresponding to one of the above-mentioned degrees issued in the French Community of Belgium under the provisions in force prior to the decree of 31 March 2004;
 - a foreign degree deemed by the admissions board to be comparable to one of those mentioned above and equivalent to at least 300 credits.
- The advanced master's degree is also open to students who, under the applicable legislation of the French Community, have access to studies leading to a second-cycle degree, and who have acquired competencies deemed by the board to have a value of at least 240 credits. As a rule, the board considers that these competencies will not be recognised if the candidate does not already have a second-cycle degree.

Teaching method

The teaching staff is made up of professors in political science, law, economics, history, sociology and philosophy from UCLouvain Saint-Louis - Bruxelles and Louvain-la-Neuve.

This team is complemented by practitioners from European institutions or the world of European public affairs (European institution officials, MEPs, diplomats, journalists, etc.) who provide additional insights into the daily functioning of the EU. They offer expert resources for the students' work.

Evaluation

The evaluation methods comply with the regulations concerning studies and exams (<https://uclouvain.be/fr/decouvrir/rgee.html>). More detailed explanation of the modalities specific to each learning unit are available on their description sheets under the heading "Learning outcomes evaluation method".

Assessments can take the form of a written or oral examination, or a written assignment in the case of the 'Think Europe' seminar, which develops the interdisciplinary aspect of the programme.

The final assignment will be assessed on the basis of a written work, under terms established by the supervisor who assesses the work alone.

Possible trainings at the end of the programme

There is no doctorate in European Studies in the French Community of Belgium. Each faculty sets the admission requirements for the doctorates it organises.
