Learning outcomes

The Advanced Master in international law is designed to provide students who have completed their studies in law with a specialized high level training in international law, covering both international public law as well as international private law. In line with the tradition established for many years at Louvain, this specialized training in international law is also firmly anchored in European law.

Programme structure

The Advanced Master in international law is a programme lasting one academic year (60 credits) made up of three main groups of activities: seven compulsory courses (35 credits), two optional subjects chosen from a wide range of option courses (10 credits) and a final assignment done in the context of a special seminar on international law and lectures on current issues (15 credits). These sessions, as well as certain other compulsory courses and some optional subjects, are reserved for students taking the Advanced Master.

Access Requirements

Teaching method

Most courses offered within the Advanced Master in International Law are based on interactive teaching methods. In some of them, students are called upon to read materials beforehand, which enables them to engage with the selected topics and discuss them during the courses

As the number of students is limited, they have access to a personalized supervision by professors, particularly on the occasion of the preparation of their Master's essay. The latter's subject-matter is determined by each student, in cooperation with one of the professors of the programme.

Evaluation

The evaluation methods comply with the <u>regulations</u> concerning studies and exams. More detailed explanation of the modalities specific to each learning unit are available on their description sheets under the heading "Learning outcomes evaluation method".

The final assessment is continuously assessed; there is also an assessment of the written overview and the dissertation. Apart from this, assessment is through written or oral examinations.
