Studying philosophy means learning to think critically and question what is going wrong in one's surroundings, or on the contrary, what is going well. A philosopher is called upon to deconstruct the obvious and the reference points which make up everyday life: language, the body, the relationship to others, space, time and death.

Being a philosopher also entails being open to rich and diverse research perspectives, and entering into dialogue with other fields of knowledge. A philosopher tackles the questions which constitute our philosophical tradition as well as those which characterise our times: s/he discovers the thoughts inherited from the past in order to construct 'figures of the thinkable' for today and tomorrow.

- Public administration and private sector: consultancy, etc.
- Cultural institutions: museums, theatres, cultural centres
- Associations: non-governmental organisations, non-profit associations and other organisations with a social vocation
- Books and publishing: collection management, choice of publications, proofreading, relations with authors, bookshops, libraries, documentation centres, etc.
- Information and communications sector: journalism, literary criticism, communications training, advertising
- Academic research
- Human resources management and corporate cultural patronage

Your programme

The programme consists of

1. general education, providing you with the knowledge you need to pursue higher education (languages, literature, human and social sciences, psychology, etc.); and
2. specialised education in philosophy, providing you with a general knowledge of philosophy and the tools you need to develop your own philosophical thinking.

This specialised education consists of theoretical courses, which will provide you with the necessary basic knowledge of the history of philosophy, and numerous seminars during which you will use your skills and learn to read and analyse philosophical texts, formulate your own arguments, and develop your intellectual curiosity through personal research.

Once you have completed your bachelor's degree, you may begin a master's degree in philosophy or ethics.

Our dual bachelor's degrees are one of the special features of UCLouvain Saint-Louis - Bruxelles.

Students can take a second bachelor's degree, in tandem with their main bachelor's degree. This means that they complete their main programme with a minimum of 60 and a maximum of 125 additional credits spread over several years. The additional bachelor's degree can be completed after the main bachelor's degree. A series of courses taken as part of the main programme count towards the additional bachelor's degree and are therefore no longer subject to assessment. The additional bachelor's degree has the same value as the main bachelor's degree and provides immediate access to the corresponding master's degree.

Learning outcomes

By the end of their bachelor's degree, students will have acquired :

I. General knowledge and interdisciplinary skills

- **Vast general and interdisciplinary knowledge by opening up to other disciplines and understanding the connections between them**

- A grounding in the fundamentals of the humanities and social sciences (principal theories, vocabulary, methods and challenges)
- The ability to build an interdisciplinary dialogue between the different humanities and social sciences and to problematise their relationship to philosophy

All general course units (CUs) and optional CUs in the humanities, e.g. Critique des sources d'information, Littératures européennes comparées, Linguistique générale, Histoire des sociétés occidentales, Sociologie; Histoire de l'art du moyen âge à nos jours, Psychologie, Religions d'occident (judaïsme, christianisme, islam) et société; Droit naturel (in French or English)

- **Knowledge in areas which are complementary to philosophy**

- In-depth knowledge in one or more subject areas by choosing a minor subject and learning to examine it through the lens of philosophy

All CUs in the chosen minor subject (English, Literature, History, Political Science) and the possibility to take other CUs as part of an additional bachelor's degree

II. Specialised knowledge

- **Specialised knowledge in fields related to philosophy and an understanding of the challenges of the discipline**

- In-depth knowledge of the major disciplines which philosophy is based on (principal theories, vocabulary, concepts, methods and challenges) and an understanding of their practice



It allows students to obtain the title of Bachelor of Philosophy and to enter the master's programmes in philosophy.

It is intended to give students who enrol in it the opportunity to broaden and consolidate their philosophical training. In this spirit, the courses in this programme are based on the student's bachelor's programme in history.

This programme counts 86 credits.

A student who has chosen the Letters and civilisations thematic module in the History programme may deduct the Philosophy of culture and history course (5 credits) from the dual degree programme. This programme will then count 81 credits.

Access based on validation of professional experience

Admission to undergraduate studies on the basis of accreditation of knowledge and skills obtained through professional or personal experience (Accreditation of Prior Experience)

Subject to the general requirements laid down by the authorities of the higher education institution, with the aim of admission to the undergraduate programme, the examination boards accredit the knowledge and skills that students have obtained through their professional or personal experience.

This experience must correspond to at least five years of documented activity, with years spent in higher education being partially taken into account: 60 credits are deemed equivalent to one year of experience, with a maximum of two years being counted. At the end of an assessment procedure organized by the authorities of the higher education institution, the Examination Board will decide whether a student has sufficient skills and knowledge to successfully pursue undergraduate studies.

After this assessment, the Examination Board will determine the additional courses and possible exemptions constituting the supplementary requirements for the student's admission.

Special requirements to access some programmes

In order to register, all candidate must first submit an application via the [KU Leuven admission platform](#). The [conditions of access](#) to this programme are specific.

The bachelor's degree in philosophy also allows access to other master's degree programmes organised by the Faculty of Philosophy, Arts and Letters or by other faculties at UCLouvain, subject to compliance with the admission requirements for these programmes. In some cases, access to the master's degree programme requires the completion of certain course units (see the admission requirements for the master's degree programme in question).
